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REMEMBER THAT THE STATE IS BORROWING FROM THE TRUST FUNDS TO PAY CURRENT EXPENSES.

We are often asked how it is that the Bingham Administration finds the means to run the House of Correction, the Agricultural Fair, and lavish thousands and tens of thousands upon party processions and party favorites.

The specific taxes are not enough; the direct taxes are not enough for the current crew now in possession of the Capitol at Lansing; but they are obliged to use the proceeds of the sales of Primary School Lands, and Swamp Lands, to satisfy their extravagance.

The State of Michigan is indebted to the Trust Funds for the purpose of running the State Government, and were it not for these Funds, our State Government would be obliged to suspend payment and go into bankruptcy.

The amount of the Trust Funds received into the Treasury since 1854, is \$186,750.10, which, in accordance with the former policy of this act, and the relation of the State, has been applied either to the reduction of the public debt, or to the payment of current expenses, or for the objects of the trust.
