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OLD POSTAGE—Our readers have all heard of this brave and eloquent Indian warrior, whose name was a terror to the American pioneers.

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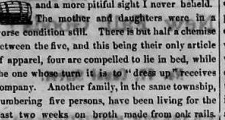
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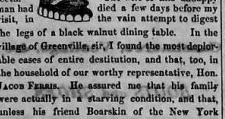
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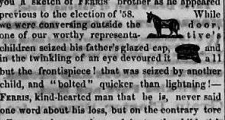

Reasons for the success of this construction is inevitable that, properly used, with a judgment guided by experience and taking counsel of practical science, Plaster for fronts will last at least two or three generations.

What is a proper use? First, the plaster is the very question to answer which you propose to appoint a committee of investigation.

1. That the highest quality of plaster be used on a corner all alike, just as a water-tight machine broke loose and began to squirt its contents to all sides...

2. That there be a space behind the front, and between it and the main wall, through which the air can circulate freely.

3. That the corners of the building be protected by iron columns, in the main wall, and that the corners of other stone, so that the rain cannot lodge there; and that the cornice, at the top, shall project far enough to drip water on the stone.

4. That due allowance be made for a very moderate swelling of the front in wet weather, and a corresponding shrinkage in dry weather.

5. That the plaster be so applied that it can reasonably be expected of any stone which is easily wrought, and is not very expensive.
