[We have received the following circular from the Rev. G. W. Knickerbocker, the well known and talented Educational preacher, at Lansing. By reference to the communication of our Lansing correspondent, it will be seen that they have had trouble in the Agricultural College. This circular explains the trouble.]

THE AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE A SECRETARIAN INSTITUTION.

To the Hon. John H. Kellogg, Hon. Wm. J. Doster, Rev. Geo. Willard, and Rev. Jas. M. Gregory, Superintendent of Public Instruction, members of the Board of Education:

GENTLEMEN:
The following memorial, which I understand has been presented to the "Faculty" of the Agricultural College, and furnished me by one of the signers, without any restriction or reservation to its use, will speak for itself:

To the Faculty of the Agricultural College:
In the Catalogue, published at the opening of the Agricultural College, it was announced to the public that "there will be religious exercises, every Sunday at the institution, the same as at Lansing, during the winter term." During the first winter term of the institution, a large majority of the students requested that Rev. Mr. Knickerbocker, of Lansing, who had been expelled, or excluded from participation in the religious exercises of the College, might be invited as well as other clergymen for the same purpose.

The students were then informed that the Professors would officiate from that time forward in the religious exercises. The understanding has not been agreeable to the Professors themselves, or the students. This rule has been departed from, and other clergymen, and persons not belonging to the Faculty, have been invited to officiate in the Chapel.
As the subscribers, students of the Agricultural College, therefore respectfully request that returns be made to the original role, and that no clergymen, including the expelled Rev. Mr. Knickerbocker, be requested to officiate in turn, in the religious exercises at the institution on Sunday.

It appears from the above memorial, that during the first year of this institution, I was excluded from participating in the religious services of the College; while other clergymen of the town were invited. And even when "a large majority of the students" requested that I should be invited to alternate with the other ministers of the place, it was denied. The other clergymen of the town were also excluded; (thinking probably, that they would quiet, if it did not satisfy the students), and it was decided that the Professors should take upon themselves, to them the onerous duty; an arrangement no less agreeable to the students also.

And it further appears that this rule has also been departed from, and others have been invited to officiate, while even to this day, the Catholic and wise rule, announced and published at the opening of the College, that there would be religious services every Sabbath at the institution, "at the clergymen in Lansing, officiating in rotation." Now then, gentlemen of the Board, I respectfully ask you, why is this? I think I have a right to press this question—nay, there is a sacred duty laid upon me in this case—and I ask not only you, but I ask the people of this State, whose College this is, and who led a deep interest in its progress, and its exclusiveness—why men of my rank, or any other religious faith, must be ostracized in an institution supported and represented by all sects?

It is because we worship the God of our Father, after the manner that some call "heresy." And is it really the design of the Faculty of the Board of Education also, to sit in judgment upon the consciences of men, and make this State institution sectarian? Such seems to be the case—yet more, it is not merely an interference, but it is plain and palpable upon the very surface of the memorial.

Here are facts; contrary to the published announcement, the clergymen styling themselves, "Orthodox" only were invited. Professor Tracy gave as a reason, to one of the students, that could not be invited, "because Unitarianism were not considered Christians." The young man expressed the same sentiment, making the institution a sectarian, but was met with the very courteous (T) reply: "If you don't like the institution, you can leave, but the Universalist minister can't be invited."

And the Rev. L. B. Fiske, as it was informed at the time, declared that he would resign his position, if it was invited to officiate in the religious services of the College. And this is understood to be the reason why all clergymen in Lansing were excluded; to prevent an outbreak among the Professors, and at the same time to quiet the students, and to have their own religious doctrines alone preached.

The above facts were well understood by some of our citizens at the time and much indignation was felt by a few, which would have found public expression had it not been

believed that the Hon. J. R. Williams, then President of the College, was in favor of the widest toleration, and that ultimately a rational, liberal and Christian practice would prevail. An earnest interest in the success of an institution, founded on generous and catholic plans, then suppressed an agitation that might mar its prospects and retard its success.

But the Rev. Mr. Fiske, being now President pro tempore of the College, who has already declared that men of my rank could not be invited, the same based on his alleged conscientious adherence to his principles, or his creed, I have no doubt the memorial will be suppressed, or perchance, referred to your Board for action. Hoping and praying that the question must be referred to you, I pass over all personal considerations, yet I should like to see a public question of this magnitude so involved. Article 4th, of the Constitution, declares as follows:

Sec. 29. The Legislature shall pass no law to prevent any person from worshipping Almighty God, according to the dictates of his own conscience; or to compel any person to attend, or not to attend, any place of religious worship, or to pay tithes, or to contribute for the support of any minister of the gospel or teaching of religion.

Sec. 30. No money shall be appropriated or drawn from the treasury, for the benefit of any religious sect or society, theological or religious; nor shall property belonging to the State be appropriated for any such purpose.

These clauses of the Constitution as you will perceive, are imperative; and a denial of the request of the students is plainly a violation of that instrument. What the direct Constitution will not directly allow, it cannot be tortured to permit by indirection. If the Legislature cannot enact by an explicit law, it cannot reach by and through the creature of a private corporation or college and cannot allow the appropriations and privileges of a public institution to be monopolized by one or more sects. If not so, it would be to impose censure upon them, it cannot establish schools and colleges to do the same thing. It remains for you to decide, whether two or three sects shall convert the Agricultural College to their uses, in an unwarrantable a manner.

The last Legislature, in which were many liberal Christians, and some Catholics, approved \$37,000 for this college, which would not have been done, had they even imagined that the College had been, or could be converted into an instrument for the propagation or support of any religious denomination.

An institution of this kind, which cannot exist by the will and be sustained by the money of the people, should be scrupulously conservative of the rights of all.
Every citizen has rights guaranteed him by the Constitution, upon which you have no right to trample. Equal rights," was the watchword of our fathers, and we ask no more, but upon this we must insist. And I cannot persuade myself that the "sovereign power" of this State will long permit their own institutions to be perverted to sectarian purposes and thus ignore and trample upon their own rights as well as religious rights and privileges.

Indeed I can hardly persuade myself, that you, gentlemen of the Board, will longer tolerate or allow this course. I therefore make my appeal to you. I wish to bring you face to face with the people, and in open court ask questions, but from the good of the College, and by the donation of the State.
And I think you will give me credit for most forbearance, when I inform you that for the past fifteen months I have suffered personal indignity, bearing in its consequences, upon others also, and yet have remained quiet.

Indeed, have you not been the witness for the last year, why a course of compromise, but practical intolerance, has been submitted to, which you have tacitly approved at this time, by a simple acquiescence, to have opened the doors of the College to all religious denominations alike.
I trust that you will no longer ignore these principles, or treat them with defiance and contempt of your government of the Agricultural College.
Since the only man in the institution, so far as I can learn, who was favorable to entire toleration, has ceased to be President, and a person is made by your act its nominal head, who avows the most narrow and bigoted views in favor of monopoly and exclusiveness, it seems necessary to speak out and appeal to you, in this direct and unequivocal manner. I shall send copies of this appeal to the parents of each student in the institution, to the members of the present Legislature, and to every member of the State. All are interested in this matter. Before the eyes of all you can set it right, if you will.

In conclusion, I claim as a right that the doors of this public institution be open alike to all both teachers and clergymen, without regard to sect or denomination.
